

See Something Send Something Mobile App

The Georgia Department of Public Safety (DPS), along with the Georgia Bureau of Investigation (GBI) and the Georgia Emergency Management and Homeland Security Agency (GEMA/HS) have led efforts to implement the "See Something, Send Something" system in Georgia.





"See Something, Send Something" provides a platform to capture a photo of suspicious activity or send in information with written text. Information received in the app is sent directly to the Georgia Information Sharing and Analysis Center (GISAC) where the tips can be evaluated and provided to law enforcement across the state as needed.

The application is available at no cost for iPhone and Android phone users, as well as iPad users.



Hepatitis A Outbreak in Georgia

- Over 250 infections since 6/1/18
- Nine times higher than in 2017
- 69% required hospitalization
- Commissioner Toomey and Dr. Drenzek sent out a letter on 4/24 regarding this outbreak

Infection Prevention and Control Considerations

Steps that facilities should implement as a routine part of triage to quickly identify, isolate, and inform public health authorities about patients who may have communicable infections:

- Ask about and document international travel histories at initial triage. This information can alert healthcare personnel to the possibility of communicable infections, such as viral hemorrhagic fevers or emerging respiratory viruses, and other health conditions, such as malaria, that need specific treatment.
- Identify patients who have fever and other signs and symptoms of infection and might warrant isolation pending further evaluation.
- Post contact information in easily visible locations for infection contro personnel and the local public health jurisdiction for reporting of communicable diseases.

Stop the Bleed is a nationwide effort that encourages bystanders to become trained, equipped, and empowered to help in a bleeding emergency before professional help arrives.



Stop-the-Bleed Kits for Hospital EDs

- Funded by the Trauma Commission
- Hospitals with EDs will receive
 - 5 tourniquets
 - 1 training tourniquet
- Training will be provided to ED clinicians or ED clinical educators



Human Trafficking

In a 2014 survey of about 100 survivors of sex trafficking, **88 percent** said that while they were being trafficked they had contact with a **health care provider**, typically someone in an emergency department

Georgia Law on Human Trafficking

Georgia Code Title 16-5.47/House Bill 141 requires adult entertainment, emergency rooms, farm labor contractors, rest stops, hotels, massage parlors, and other businesses to post a notice informing about trafficking resources

- (5) Operated by a nonprofit, nongovernmental organization; and

- 1) Maintain an account in GHA911.org
- 2) Join their Healthcare Coalition; provide evidence of participation, at least annually, in communication drills with the coalition and/or attendance at coalition meetings
- 3) Provide evidence of contact, at least annually, with the local emergency management agency for the area in which the facility is located

January 1, 2019 - effective date for compliance


